Ohiopyle, DCNR land swap complete

HARRISBURG - A land swap between necessary. Ohiopyle borough and the state Department of Conservation and Natural Resources is complete, state Rep. Matthew Dowling (4R-51st) said Fri-

Under Act 60 of 2020, the state was authorized to convey land it owned in Ohiopyle borough in exchange for borough land.

The swap will provide additional water access for DCNR and the state park, Dowling said in a press release.

t will provide developable property for Ohiopyle borough, which could lead to a future revenue stream, he said.

The property conveyance would also allow the borough additional room to update an adjacent sewagetreatment plant, should it become

Dowling said residents — as well as anyone who chooses to visit the state park — benefit by gaining additional, high-quality recreational opportunities.

"Through the continued partnership between the borough of Ohiopyle and the DCNR, this land exchange will enable Ohiopyle to increase its community base footprint, thus stabilizing and securing the heritage and culture of its citizens, which makes Ohiopyle special," Ohiopyle borough Councilman Conrad Hamather said. "This is a logical step in the planning and continuation of the borough into the future for new generations to share the rich natural capitals afforded to its stakeholders.

The land swap was completed in mid -April.

Braddock Road (Rock Fort Camp)

This marker, dedicated on Tuesday, June 17, 1952 by the PMHC is located at the intersection of US 40 atop Summit Mountain at the Jumonville Road (SR 2021) at the Jumonville Camp and retreat center in North Union Township. It states the following:

"General Braddock's tenth camp, June 26, 1755, on the march to Fort Duquesne, was at the Half King's Rock, one mile NE of here. The Rock was named for Washington's friend Tanacharisson, the Iroquois viceroy (half king) of the Ohio Indians. Washington met him here in 1754. "



VOLUNTEERS PLAY CRUCIAL ROLE IN CONQUERING COVID-19

Uniontown. PA - Retirees. Health care workers. Members of a religious community. They come from diverse backgrounds, but these volunteers and many others are united in a common cause: to do what they can, in whatever way they can, to mitigate the spread of one of the deadliest viruses in history.

The COVID-19 pandemic has been the chief health concern across the nation for more than a year, but the advent of vaccines could mean the end of the battle against this deadly virus is near. Now, the focus is on getting those vaccines to the public in a guick and efficient manner.

The Fayette County Vaccine Taskforce Domer is a member of Spring Valley, has stepped up to organize those efforts locally, working to help residents receive shots as soon as possi-

Volunteers have been a crucial part of this stage of the battle, whether they are manning call centers to schedule vaccination appointments or coming out of retirement to help administer shots.

"They are completely important," said Highlands Hospital Director of Pharmacy Matthew Mascia during a vaccine clinic at Pleasant Valley Masonic Center in Bullskin Township in March, "Without the volunteers, it doesn't work. Right now, the hospital is not staffed to do this kind of extra outreach. We absolutely rely on all of the volunteers. There are five of us from the hospital here today. The rest are all people who decided to come help us and volunteer their time. It really is the volunteers putting the long days in."

Among those volunteers was Robin Brooks, a retired registered nurse "It's important that everyone gets the important. It's vital to this whole vaccine, and I had time now that I'm retired," Brooks said. "It's important that we do this, that we try to help get this virus under control." Highlands Hospital Pharmacy Coordinator Jodie Menear said helping out at vaccine clinics is sometimes part of her job, but at other times, she turns up to volunteer.

this pandemic," she said. "I feel like I'm really helping every time. It's important."

Still other volunteers, like Mary Saylor, are private citizens who just want to do something.

"My granddaughter is a nurse, and she asked me if I'd volunteer," Saylor said, adding that she also volunteers with the Red Cross, Salvation Army, and "anybody else that needs it." Sonna Domer and Bernee Coffin are center at the WVU Medicine Uniontown Hospital clinic held in the former Burlington Coat Factory space in the Uniontown Mall.

a Bruderhof community in Farmington. She said she is one of five members of the community who turned

Domer said she enjoys volunteering, and in the case of the pandemic, doing so was an easy choice.

"People are dying," she said. "Five hundred and fifty thousand people are dying."

Domer said manning the phones at the call center and hearing people's stories has given her insight into their pain, their grief, and their day-to-day struggles.

"People are losing their families, not to mention their jobs," she said. "They are having to homeschool and

teach their kids at home."

Coffin said she also does volunteer work at a hospital and a senior center and is helping out at the clinic and call center "however I can, with the phone lines or disinfecting or whatever they need me for."

Coffin said the work she and the other volunteers is doing is "very

County officials and their staff members also have been involved in the volunteer effort. Officials and staffers from the county commissioners' offices, as well as the offices of state senators and representatives, have manned the phones, done paperwork, or helped keep the vaccine "I think this is really helping to control clinics clean and sterile – whatever

was needed.

Many around the area felt they owed volunteers a debt of gratitude – and a few rewards. Numerous local businesses and private individuals donated toward the volunteer effort, some providing meals and snacks, and others donating funds to pay for those meals and other items the volunteers may need.

Among the donors was Columbia Gas of Pennsylvania. Communication specialist Corrine Brewer said the company recently partnered with the Leadership Washington County program for its Feed the Fight Campaign.

"We were given kind of an opportunity to do the same thing two of the volunteers working the call in Fayette County," she said. "We connected with the Fayette Chamber of Commerce, and they offered up the vaccine clinic as a way to use some of those funds." The funds went toward providing meals for volunteers staffing the vaccine clinic. Brewer said the company's local employees really like to get involved and help the community, something they haven't been able to do in person because of the virus. So, they were more than happy to do something to benefit the volunteers.

> "The volunteers helping with the vaccine clinic, the frontline workers, the nurses – they're all vital to helping everything get back to normal," Brewer said.

Chip Giannetti of Phil Giannetti Motors in Brownsville was inspired to do something to thank volunteers as well.

"I was so overwhelmed by the organization and the process that it was just fantastic," he said. "It made me proud to be from Fayette County."

So, Giannetti provided doughnuts for the volunteers as a token of his support.

"I didn't know what else to do," he said. "I'm not used to Fayette County knocking it out of the ballpark like that, and they definitely did. It's a really, really sweet thing to be able to participate in."

Goal Achieved!!! And Not Stopping!!!

This past week has been a busy week with me continuing to walk the Youghiogheny River Trail North (YRT-N), which is a part of the larger Great Allegheny Passage that links Pittsburgh through Connellsville to Cumberland, where if one wishes they can connect to the Chesapeake and Ohio (C&O) Canal Towpath, a National Historical Towpath to Washington D.C. There are also plans to go beyond Pittsburgh to points North (Erie) and West (Ohio), in part making it part of the USA Rail Trail.

This week's weather has had its ups and downs. We had breaks for two days at one time and one day in between due to rain, however we went at least a mile and a half every day getting to that fourth set of benches.

As I mentioned last week I had made it as far as a rockslide, and I continued to do that late last week, however, I saw a FIFTH set of benches not too far in the distance. This past weekend we went to those benches where a Old Mile Marker saying it was 57 miles to Pittsburgh via the former Pittsburgh and Lake Erie (P&LE) railroad that the trail surface is on one track today. The other track is for horseback riders and they can ride all the way to "little" Boston near McKeesport in Allegheny County.

Meanwhile, while sitting at this bench, I notice that the West Yough Bridge Scenic Overlook is not too far in the distance. After contemplating for a moment, we decide that we would venture the 1 tenth or so of a mile to the bridge, which was nice. Some improvements were made since our visit last fall, but one has to remember that I had gained thirty pounds since that visit and have lost almost twenty of that or so.

I have experienced weight gain at my worst. It got to points I couldn't get through Walmart without being out of breath. I could hardly stand up for long periods of time. I would worry if I could make it through a fire drill at work if one occurred there a day I am there and be able to stand through the evacuation process.

It has been a month almost to the day that we planned this goal to get to this point of the trail. My mother was excited too. Because we encourage each other, although she claims I encourage her more than she encourages me. Its just getting there and heading down the trail that is the hardest part of it all. On the day I reached the bridge for the first time, I didn't dream of making it past the third bench. Surprises come in little ways.

FAYETTE VACCINE TASKFORCE MARKS PROGRESS, ANNOUNCES NEW GOALS

Uniontown, PA – The Fayette County COVID-19 Vaccine Taskforce has made significant progress with its homebound vaccination initiative, since launching only weeks ago.

Created with guidance from the Pennsylvania Department of Health and Centers for Diseases Control and Prevention, the new system allows the Fayette County Emergency Management Agency, as well as various EMS partner providers and WVU Medicine Uniontown Hospital, to provide homebound residents with vaccinations.

A homebound resident is defined as someone who is unable to leave their home due to illness.

EMS will travel to residents' locations to administer both first and second doses of secured Moderna vaccine via appointment, vastly expanding the county's successful vaccination program.

Task Force Co-chair Muriel Nuttall said there are already more than 100 residents on the homebound vaccination list, and members are in the process of identifying more.

"We're trying to make our appointment list as comprehensive and complete as possible, before we begin administering any homebound vaccinations,"

Those who are homebound, or caregivers of homebound residents, are encouraged to call the Fayette County Vaccine Scheduling Center at 724-430-3900; or register the individual at www.fayettecountypa.org.

Once on the website, select the yellow COVID-19 tab and "Individual Registration" from the dropdown menu. On the registration form, there is now an option to select if you are homebound.

After providing the entity with all necessary information, the Fayette County COVID-19 Taskforce will then contact you to schedule your appointment.

Additionally, if you are physically able to travel but do not have transportation, you may contact the Fayette Area Coordinated Transportation (FACT) office to arrange for transportation to one of the county task force clinics. Call FACT at 724-628-7433 for more information, as the cost of transportation can be covered in many cases.

Please note that there is no charge for the vaccine.

Earlier this month, Pennsylvania Gov. Tom Wolf announced all Pennsylvania adults would be eligible to schedule appointments to receive the COVID-19 vaccine beginning April 13. The state decision mirrored a federal decision to accelerate the vaccination timetable for citizens in Phases 1B. 1C and 2.

As a result, the Fayette County COVID-19 Vaccine Taskforce has set a new goal of vaccinating all county residents who wish to receive the vaccine by May 31.

The task force's partner providers have updated their clinical schedules to now include afterhours appointments. Additionally, the task force will specifically target the working population and younger people, ages 16 to 18, encouraging them to get vaccinated.

Stefano, Dowling: Grants awarded to enhance area recreation

Two municipalities in the 32nd Senatorial district have been awarded a total of \$304,900 in state funding for projects to enhance recreational opportunities for area residents, according to state Sen. Pat Stefano (R-32) and state Rep. Matt Dowling (R-51).

The grants were awarded by the Commonwealth Financing Authority under its Trails and Recreation Program.

"These projects are crucial to showcasing our natural resources and providing area residents with opportunities to enjoy the outdoors," Stefano said. "I'm pleased that this funding will help to improve the quality of life for area residents."

"It's exciting to see two worthy municipalities at opposite ends of the county receive this funding to stimulate recreation," said Dowling.

"These local parks are so meaningful to our communities here in Fayette County. Comfort in recreation leads to a better sense of overall wellness and well-being; an investment in recreation is an investment in better health. I'm proud to see that this funding will come to benefit both German and Wharton townships."

German Township received a \$225,000 grant to construct Phase 1 of a municipal park at 208 Edenborn Road, several miles from the Browns Run Trail along the Monongahela River.

The construction will include site preparation, construction of sidewalks, installation of picnic tables and playground equipment, and fencing for the neighborhood park, which will be particularly targeted to toddlers and younger children.

"Combined with the Brown's Run Trail, the County's German Masontown Park, and the proposed neighborhood park, this region will be greatly served by an abundant amount of recreational opportunities," Stefano said.

Wharton Township in Philipsburg received \$79,900 to construct additional restroom facilities at the Municipal Park located on Elliotsville Road just behind the Municipal Complex Building.

Regarding the awards, Stefano and Dowling noted that the park currently has one compost restroom facility, but with the high demand of users and organized sporting activities and events at the park, another permanent facility is needed to accommodate demand.

The grants were awarded by the Commonwealth Financing Authority under its Watershed and Restoration Program and Greenways, Trails and Recreation Program. The program is funded with money assessed by the Commonwealth through the state's Impact Fee, which is paid by the state's unconventional natural gas producers.

FAYETTE COUNTY MARKING BROADBAND PROJECT EXPANSION

Uniontown, PA - Fayette County officials celebrated their latest broadband infrastructure expansion with a ribbon cutting ceremony Wednesday morning.

Last year, county commissioners Dave Lohr, Chairman; Vince Vicites and Scott Dunn utilized a portion of the county's allotted CARES Act federal funding to expand WiFi Internet capabilities along the state Route 40 corridor. "CARES" stands for Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic

The work, completed in December by Vitalink LLC of Markleysburg, was part of a Design Build Broadband Deployment contract focused on installing broadband "hotspots" countywide.

Since its completion, the project has had a major impact on citizens, businesses and visitors, by making the internet more easily accessible to those in our many rural areas. Signage is currently being installed countywide, designating the broadband hotspots.

Hosted by the Fayette Chamber of Commerce and Fayette County Board of Commissioners, the project ribbon cutting took place at the Canaan Church of the Brethren in Gibbon Glade. Local, state and federal legislators were represented during the event.

The once-remote church, located in a rural portion of Wharton Township, is now so well-connected that it attracts internet such user, Christal Burnsworth, spent several months making daily trips to the church, seeking connectivity.

"Our schooling has been greatly impacted by the pandemic," Burnsworth said. "We did several months of remote and virtual learning due to COVID."

Affectionately referred to as "Miss B" by her students at Kingwood Elementary School in Kingwood, W. Va., Burnsworth is a kindergarten teaching assistant who resides in Gibbon Glade. She is also an academic instructor for the school's After School Explorers Program (ASE), which has been virtual for the past year due to the pandemic.

"I didn't have reliable internet access at all, and I was told the county had put a

hotspot in the Gibbon Glade area, at the church. Thanks to that, I was able to drive just a short distance to get reliable internet," Burnsworth said. "This allowed me to teach online and help students for a few hours in the evening. These were students who were falling behind due to the pandemic; really struggling with remote learning and needing the one-on-one interac-

Burnsworth's success with the broadband hotspot eventually led her to contract with Vitalink LLC as her home internet provider. can now teach from home with no issues. and the service has been stellar," she said. "I cannot thank the county and Vitalink enough for making it possible to reach out to students and help where the need was so great. I hope many others are enjoying it as much as my family has."

Commissioner Dunn said expanding Fayette County's broadband infrastructure is important for so much more than just the educational opportunities it creates for our students.

"Our outlying communities will be able to have the same opportunities as our urban centers, creating equality in education, business and residential development," Dunn said. "I pledge to continue to expand this infrastructure as money becomes available."

Commissioner Vicites said the ribbon cutting signifies that the county's initial users from far and wide to its hotspot. One efforts to expand its broadband infrastructure have become a reality.

> "We spent our CARES Act money very effectively by expanding broadband, and now we're ready to take it to the next level in the future. Our ultimate goal is to offer connectivity to every household, school, medical facility and business that wants it," Vicites said. "This is the infrastructure of the future, and we don't want to miss that opportunity, because funding is finally available to complete these important upgrades across Fayette County." Vicites said Fayette is already at the cusp of being much further ahead in its broadband development than other rural counties across Pennsylvania and nationwide. "Our efforts as county commissioners have allowed us to seize this opportunity and

position Fayette County for many economic development opportunities that haven't existed in the past," he said. "Not only are we laying the groundwork for new infrastructure, but we can increase the connectivity and speeds of existing broadband through deployment of this activity." Commissioner Chairman Lohr said he's "excited beyond words" to see a project he's been working toward for "quite some time" come to fruition.

"While broadband access is something that so many people take for granted, here in Fayette County, there are vast regions with little or no access. The barriers that presents really came to the forefront through COVID, as people were needing to work or attend school remotely," Lohr said. "But how do you do that effectively when you don't have reliable broadband?" Lohr said the project opened the door to future development and connectivity to even more industries, such as medical, psychological and social services, as well as churches.

"It also let our citizens stay connected with family and friends. Those living in outlying communities will have the access to goods and services that everyone with reliable broadband takes for granted," he said. "Although some of our more remote regions are attractive to companies looking to do business in Fayette County, no modern business entity is likely to come here without reliable broadband access. Development is good for those communities because with it comes job opportunities, as well as new residents and their families. When we increase our tax base, everyone benefits."

Department Of Health Updates Mask Guidance Following CDC Announcement

Harrisburg, PA - Department of Health Acting Secretary Alison Beam announced that the department has updated its mask guidance to reflect the announcement made by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) earlier today.

"Today's CDC announcement allows those who are fully vaccinated the opportunity to spend time outdoors, in some situations, without wearing a mask," Acting Secretary Beam said. "This is both welcomed and exciting news for individuals who are fully vaccinated and are at a significantly lower risk to serious illness from COVID-19. However, those who are not vaccinated will still need to wear a mask in most situations, and those who are fully vaccinated should still wear a mask when in crowded spaces."

The CDC provided information today about activities that fully vaccinated people can do, including:

- Visiting with other fully vaccinated people indoors without wearing masks or physical distancing.
- Visiting with unvaccinated people (including children) from a single household who are at low risk for severe COVID-19 disease indoors without wearing masks or physical distancing.
- Participating in outdoor activities and recreation without a mask, except in certain crowded settings and venues.
- Resuming domestic travel and refraining from testing before or after travel, or self-quarantine after travel.
- Refraining from testing before leaving the United States for international travel (unless required by the destination) and refraining from self-quarantine after arriving back in the United States.
- Refraining from testing following a known exposure, if asymptomatic, with some exceptions for specific settings.

• Refraining from quarantine following a known exposure if asymptomatic.

- Refraining from routine COVID-19 testing if asymptomatic and if feasible. However, for now, fully vaccinated people are still advised to continue to:
- Take precautions like wearing a well-fitted mask in indoor public settings.
- Wear masks that fit snuggly when visiting indoors with unvaccinated people who are at increased risk for severe COVID-19 disease or who have an unvaccinated household member who is at increased risk for severe COVID-19 disease.
- Wear well-fitted masks when visiting indoors with unvaccinated people from multiple households.
- Avoid indoor large-sized, in-person gatherings.
- Get tested if experiencing COVID-19 symptoms.
- Follow guidance issued by individual employers.
- Follow CDC and health department travel requirements and recommendations. Additional guidance for those who are fully vaccinated is available on the CDC website.

"Today's announcement underscores the importance of getting vaccinated to protect yourself from COVID-19," said Acting Physician General Dr. Denise Johnson. "It is important that people who have compromised immune systems consult with their physician as to whether they may need to continue to wear a mask in some of these situations."

The Pennsylvania Department of Health's <u>masking order from March</u> 20210 incorporates CDC masking guidance for fully vaccinated individuals, including this guidance.

Apple Cake

- ⇒3 Large Eggs
- ⇒2 Cups Sugar
- ⇒1 Cup Oil
- ⇒1 Tsp. Vanilla
- \Rightarrow 1 Tsp. Salt
- ⇒1 Tsp. Baking Soda
- ⇒1 Tsp. Cinnamon
- ⇒3 Cups Flour
- ⇒4-5 Medium Sliced apples
- \Rightarrow 1/2 Cup nuts, optional

Mix Ingredients & Bake in loaf pan for 1 hour at 345 degrees.

INGREDIENTS

- ⇒ 2 x 150g pkts Oreo Classic biscuits
- ⇒ 70g unsalted butter, melted
- ⇒ 2 tablespoons boiling water
- ⇒ 1 tablespoon gelatin powder
- ⇒ 500g cream cheese, at room temperature
- ⇒ 155g (3/4 cup) caster sugar
- ⇒ 125ml (1/2 cup) thickened cream
- ⇒ 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

CHOCOLATE GANACHE

- ⇒ 100g dark cooking chocolate, finely chopped
- \Rightarrow 60ml (1/4 cup) thickened cream.

METHOD

Step 1

Line a straight-sided 7cm-deep, 9.5 x 19.5cm (base measurement) loaf pan with baking paper, allowing 2 long sides to overhang.

Step 2

Process half the biscuits in a food processor until finely crushed. Add the butter and process until well combined. Spread the biscuit mixture firmly over the base of the pan. Chill for 30 minutes or until firm.

Step 3

Meanwhile, place water in a heatproof bowl. Sprinkle with gelatin. Place bowl in a larger bowl halffilled with boiling water. Set aside, stirring often, for 5 minutes or until gelatin dissolves. Cool slightly.

Step 4

Process cream cheese, sugar, cream and vanilla in a food processor until smooth. Add the gelatin mixture. Process to combine. Pour into a bowl. Quarter remaining biscuits. Stir into cheese mixture. Pour into pan. Smooth surface. Chill for 6 hours or until set. Transfer to a plate.

Step 5

For ganache, place chocolate in a heatproof bowl. Bring cream almost to the boil in a small saucepan over medium-low heat. Pour the cream over the chocolate. Set aside for 5 minutes, then stir until smooth. Set aside for 10 minutes to cool slightly.

Step 6

Pour the ganache over the cheesecake..
